March, Book One

John Lewis (Teen Graphic Bio Lewis) 2013

March is a vivid first-hand account of John Lewis' lifelong struggle for civil and human rights, meditating in the modern age on the distance traveled since the days of Jim Crow and segregation. Rooted in Lewis' personal story, it also reflects on the highs and lows of the broader civil rights movement.

March, Book Two

John Lewis (Teen Graphic Bio Lewis) 2015

After the success of the Nashville sit-in campaign, John Lewis is more committed than ever to changing the world through nonviolence -- but as he and his fellow Freedom Riders board a bus into the vicious heart of the deep south, they will be tested like never before.

March, Book Three

John Lewis (Teen Graphic Bio Lewis) 2016

By the fall of 1963, the Civil Rights Movement has penetrated deep into the American consciousness, and as chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, John Lewis is guiding the tip of the spear. The only hope for lasting change is to give voice to the millions of Americans silenced by voter suppression: "One Man, One Vote."

They Called Us Enemy

George Takei (Teen Graphic Bio Takei) 2019

A stunning graphic memoir recounting actor/author/activist George Takei's childhood imprisoned within American concentration camps during World War II.

American Born Chinese

Gene Luen Yang (Teen Graphic Yang) 2006

Alternates three interrelated stories about the problems of young Chinese Americans trying to participate in the popular culture.

Maus

Art Spiegelman (Teen Graphic 940.53) 1993

The author-illustrator traces his father's imprisonment in a Nazi concentration camp through a series of disarming and unusual cartoons arranged to tell the story as a novel.

Nat Turner

Kyle Baker (Teen Graphic Bio Turner) 2008

Tells the story of Nat Turner and the Southampton County, Virginia, slave rebellion.

Seventh grader Jordan Banks loves nothing more than drawing cartoons about his life. But instead of sending him to the art school of his dreams, his parents enroll him in a prestigious private school known for its academics, where Jordan is one of the few kids of color in his entire grade.

Satchel Paige: Striking Out Jim Crow

James Sturm (J BIO Paige) 2007

Satchel Paige began his baseball career in the Negro Leagues in Alabama in the 1920s. For years, Jim Crow laws, which segregated blacks and whites, kept him out of the major leagues. But they couldn't stop him from becoming a world-class athlete. This is a fictionalized account of a real-life sports hero.
